




Careers - They Did It Again!

Subject Focus: Computer Science

How do you know a dog is a dog when you see one? How did you learn this? This is a problem that computer scientists look at when trying to develop artificial intelligence. In fact, computer science is all about solving problems.

In all years we aim to develop student's ability to solve problems. This can be done through logical reasoning or through using a computer. Sometimes it is a matter of working out the logic like in a game of hangman, on other occasions, it is more difficult because of the time it would take to do manually, like working out how many times the words war and peace are written in the book War and Peace. You could do this by reading through and keeping a tally but there are over half a million words in the book! A better way is to get the computer to do it for you as computers can do repetitive tasks very quickly. For those that are interested, war is written 161 times and peace is written 51 times (and is written 18,220 times).

In year 7 one of the first topics we look at is logic problems and this continues all the way through to A-Level. The first question in an A-Level paper has been solving a murder mystery logic problem – This has been adapted here, can you solve who killed Mr Roberts?

- The famous detective Mr Stone was called in to solve a perplexing murder mystery. He determined the following facts.
- Mr Roberts, the murdered man, was killed by a blow on the head.
- Either Mr Barnett or Mr Tipler was in the dining room at the time of the murder.
- If Mr Taylor was in the kitchen at the time of the murder, then Mrs Naylor killed Mr Roberts using poison.
- If Mr Barnett was in the dining room at the time of the murder, then Mr Snowdon killed Mr Roberts.
- If Mr Taylor was not in the kitchen at the time of the murder, then Mr Tipler was not in the dining room when the murder was committed.
- If Mr Tipler was in the dining room at the time the murder was committed, then Mr Joyce killed Mr Roberts.
- If Mr Moore was in the hall at the time of the murder, then Mr Barnett killed Mr Roberts by a blow to the neck with a saucepan.

The year 9 students are just starting with their escape room challenge, where they are given a series of puzzles that require them to use their problem-solving skills, their knowledge of computer science and their mathematical skills to progress through a series of challenges. It is always impressive to see how well the students can quickly solve problems that for many would seem impossible.

Who knows, in the future, one of our students may go on to solve one of the Millennium Problems from the Clay Institute and win themselves \$1,000,000 or even to work out how do we learn to recognise a dog!

Year 10 Students - Arkwright Engineering Scholarship



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Practice Makes Perfect


On Wednesday 7th July Year 10 students gained experience of interview practice with volunteers from local businesses through online meetings. For the majority of students, this was their first experience of an interview situation.

Students were able to practice their presentation and interview skills before receiving feedback on their technique and responses to help them to develop their skills for future interviews. With many employers and universities expressing their interest in continuing to interview candidates online the virtual interview format was a very valuable experience.

Volunteers came from a diverse range of employers including KPMG, ENGIE, Covea Insurance, Balfour Beatty, Barclays, RAF, and Ramsdens Solicitors.

The students commented on how valuable they found the experience as it encouraged them to reflect upon their skills in preparation for future interviews. Evaluation from the day included:

- "It helped build confidence in me as this was my first experience at an interview"
- "Helped me overcome fears and understand certain strengths and weaknesses"
- "I now feel prepared for future interviews and I am much less worried about them now"
- "It enabled me to focus on my key points which will allow me to increase my understanding of how to act and approach interviews in the future"
- "It put me in a situation I can see myself in, in the future and helped me to focus on self-reflection"
- "The interviewer gave me some constructive criticism which has helped me to think about how I present myself, but they also told me in what ways I have presented myself well which has given me confidence for the future"



The employers were overwhelming positive in their feedback with one commenting "your students are an absolute credit to your school, so prepared, polite, professional and enthusiastic" and another "the students knocked my socks off"!!

Progression Conference

On Thursday 1 and Friday 2 July, students in years 10 and 12 participated in our annual Progression Conference - held this year for the first, and hopefully final, time in a fully live-virtual format. The Conference featured speakers from a range of institutions - from leading universities such as Cambridge and Sheffield to major apprenticeship providers such as Morrisons and Nestle - who delivered inspiring and, in the circumstances, remarkably interactive talks on topics from post-18 research to student finance and university personal statements. For many staff and students, however, the highlight of the Conference was an hour-long alumni panel featuring six former students who have recently left HGS to pursue a range of different progression pathways, both in the UK and abroad. All who attended would doubtless echo Mr Gilroy's sentiments: "Thank you for these very interesting talks from very impressive young people."





Recruitment for the September 2021 scheme is open! - Volunteer Police Cadets scheme for 13 – 17 year olds

Are you interested in becoming a Volunteer Police Cadet?

- Do you have an interest in policing and public services?
- Would you like to volunteer in the service of your community?
- Would you like to complete the Duke of Edinburgh's Award?



Eligibility

You will be eligible to apply to the scheme if you meet the following criteria:

- 13 – 17 years of age
- Will be in year 9 or above at school/college in the new academic year this September
- Live in the county of West Yorkshire

Our programme is linked to the Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE). You must be in year 9 or above to register for the Bronze Award.

If you already have the Bronze Award and would be interested in completing the Silver Award, you may be offered the opportunity to join one of the Silver groups.

The scheme is not an entry route into a policing career, but you will have the opportunity to gain an insight into policing, develop key life skills and support your local community.

We welcome cadets from any background.

What's involved?

As a Volunteer Police Cadet, you will have the opportunity to:

- gain an insight into policing
- make a difference to your local community through volunteering
- achieve the DofE Award
- take part in fun and exciting activities
- make new friendships
- develop key life skills

Cadet units meet once a week for two hours during the school term. This is normally after school in the late afternoon/early evening. Please contact your preferred location for details of local meeting days and times.

Volunteering events and expeditions usually take place on weekends.

West Yorkshire Police's Volunteer Police Cadets scheme follows a two-year programme, which is linked to the Duke of Edinburgh's Award (D of E). Over 300 cadets currently take part in the programme across all five districts of West Yorkshire.

Locations: - We are recruiting cadets in the following locations: - Bradford, Calderdale*, Kirklees, Leeds and Wakefield.



