A Level Music Trip

On Saturday 8 February our year 12 A Level Music students attended a superb concert at Leeds Town Hall. It was a fantastic evening with some incredible music. The programme included Tchaikovsky's 'Fantasy Overture: Romeo and Juliet', the world premiere of Edward Gregson's 'A Vision in a Dream: concerto for oboe and orchestra' and Berlioz's 'Symphonie fantastique'. The latter work is a piece of music the students had just finished studying in class for their A Level course, so it was a perfect opportunity to listen to the piece in full, played live by the BBC Philharmonic orchestra. We attended a pre-concert talk which gave us the brilliant opportunity to hear from one of the night's composers: Edward Gregson. He gave us an insight into how he composed his Oboe concerto and also informed us about his life as a composer. Thank you to the students for being wonderful, as ever. This was the first of two A Level Music trips; on Friday we are going to watch Opera North perform Mozart's *The Marriage of Figaro* at Leeds Grand Theatre and also take part in a workshop with members from the company. 


1. Barry's Blocks

Saskia commented, "In my previous school, there were never any external opportunities within art, so when I heard about Articulate I really wanted to do it. Art and Art History has always been an interest of mine, so writing the presentation was an enjoyable as well as an educational process. I chose to talk about Andy Warhol's Last Supper as the painting is bursting with symbolism as well as religious imagery. These factors meant that the painting stayed with me after I saw it, leading it to become one of my favourite paintings.

The competition day itself was nerve-wracking as well as exciting. The other competitors were incredibly interesting to listen to. Nobody had studied a similar painting or genre of art, so each presentation was individually thought provoking. When it came to be my turn to present, I was nervous due to high standard of talent participating. However, I tried my hardest to make my presentation engaging and interesting, and overall, I'm happy with what I did. The experience has helped my writing ability of critical analysis of art, as well as my public speaking."

It's exam season in the Art Department

Both year 11 (GCSE) and year 13 (A-Level) are now working hard on their examination projects in Art. This examination is a full, self-directed project, based on a theme or brief taken from a question paper provided by the examination board (AQA). The examination projects will take up almost all the students remaining time left on the GCSE and A-level courses. Students must carry out their own research into the theme or brief, investigate the work of relevant artists and then produce their own visual ideas in response; leading to a timed period under examination conditions when they work on bringing their project to a close. Year 11 are allowed 10 hours of supervised time to do this, whilst year 13 are allowed 15 hours.

This usually involves the students creating some sort of a final piece or outcome for their project.

This is an example of the start of an exam' visual investigation from one of last year's 11 GCSE students, Isabella Myers, as we are unable to post photographs of live work for the current exam.
