<u> Alumni - Moira Paterson</u>



Moira Paterson, who has died aged 85. moved from a small Scotland town in to pursue a career publishing in and journalism that included stints in Geneva and Jerusalem and work as a subeditor and features writer with Radio Times the and the Observer in London.

She was born near Crossmichael in Kirckcudbrightshire, to Margaret (nee McHargh), a nurse,

and John, an electrician with ICI whose job took the family to live in Yorkshire. Her father was a progressive-minded man who wanted the best for his two daughters, and after passing the 11-plus Moira went to Heckmondwike Grammar School followed by the University of Durham, where she studied English.

She then worked in London for the poetry publisher Faber & Faber, where TS Eliot was a director. When he brought the female staff members a cake as a gift of thanks, she was so annoyed at how "pink and girly" it was that she resolved to leave.

She moved to Geneva to work for the art publisher Skira in the early 1960s and then to Jerusalem, first to live on a kibbutz (where she was looking for an adventure, following the breakup of a long relationship) and later to work as an editor of the Encyclopaedia Judaica. Although she was a Scottish atheist, Moira's ability to grasp the intricacies of Jewish lore was testimony to her intellect and perseverance.

She returned to London in the 70s, working as a subeditor and occasional features writer on the Radio Times, where the poet Roger Woddis wrote a verse to celebrate her strong trade unionism, her pride in her Scots background and her sometimes fierce exterior that belied a warm and humorous interior:

O our Moira's like a red, red flag That flutters in the breeze And nae mair like a willing slave Than chalk resembles cheese.

Later she was a subeditor at the Observer and the Independent, also contributing features to both newspapers. She retired in 1996 and moved back to Scotland to live in Wigtown near her sister, my mother, Rennie Hughes. She remained fiercely independent until 2017, when she went into a care home.

There is around 50 teams in the league and Max's team finished first only loosing 1 game (out of 14) all

season. This is a huge achievement in rugby league and the first time in 40 years that a team from Birstall Victoria have won the division 1 title. Max played a huge part in this.

Department Focus - Geography

1.5 degrees is a contentious figure now as the world leaders attend the 26th Conference of the Parties (COP). The conference held in Glasgow started this week and will last until the 12th of November. The importance of the conference cannot be understated as it could decide all our futures. The Geography department tries to give students an understanding of the importance that climate change poses for everyone by building on themes covered from Year 7, to Year 13 and beyond. We all live on



a cascading planet where everything is interlinked and where we are not able to isolate ourselves from such global changes. I urge you all to engage with the COP26 from watching progress on the news to making changes wherever you can.

One way in which you can get involved is by helping us achieve an internationally recognized award. Three years ago the Geography department started to work on an accreditation for the Eco-Schools Green Flag award, we met once a week to work on an audit of the schools environmental credentials based on a seven step process. We chose 3 areas to work on from the Ten Eco-Schools topics:

- Biodiversity, caring for all plants, animals and insects.
- Energy, reducing energy use and investigating greener energy sources.
- Global Citizenship, working with others on local and global issues.
- Healthy Living, improving mental and physical well-being.
- Litter, taking action to reduce litter in your local area and beyond.
- Marine, protecting rivers, canals, lakes, oceans and the plants and animals that inhabit them.
- School Grounds, enhancing your learning environment.
- Transport, travelling in an environmentally-friendly manner.
- Waste, refusing, reducing, reusing, repairing and recycling.
- Water, protecting our most important natural resource.

Unfortunately we could not complete the award as Covid caused the school to close, when the school reopened we could not mix the year groups to meet and as the award requires representatives from every year group, once again could not work on this award. The Geography department wants to reopen the Eco-Schools initiative and work to complete the Green flag award.



What this means is that we need volunteers from every year group to start the process again. This will need a dedicated team to spend the year on the seven-step process required to achieve success and join an international group of schools that are committed to environmental education.


