Remembrance 2021



Remembrance is the act of honouring those who serve to defend our democratic freedoms and way of life.



Student representatives from Years 7 & 8 were invited to attend the Heckmondwike Remembrance Day service in Green Park with Headteacher Mr Roberts and led by The Royal British Legion. Students from Heckmondwike Primary School and the local community were able to stand shoulder to shoulder this year and unite to remember the service and sacrifice of the Armed Forces from Britain and the Commonwealth.

The sun shone briefly on the small crowd at the war memorial, after the two minutes silence students laid small wooden crosses with handwritten messages onto the granite plinth.


Remembrance Day started in school with assemblies for each year group, our young musicians played the violin and piano as students entered in silence. Whilst names of those who attended Heckmondwike Grammar School who lost their lives during the World Wars were displayed, cadets led by Mr Tipler and Mr Barnett laid wreaths on the stage after 'The Last Post' was played. Readings and prayers included 'To his Love' Ivor Gurney, 'In Flanders Fields' John McCrae and 'For the Fallen' Laurence Binyon.

Poppies have been sold for two weeks in school in aid of the poppy appeal, whilst giving to and collecting for the charity is important staff and students wear their poppies with pride as a symbol of remembrance.



Headteacher Mr Roberts will be joined by Music Teacher Mr Cole, music students along with Head Girl and Head Boy to lay a wreath in Heckmondwike park on Sunday 13 November at noon.

Department Focus - Politics

This year, the department launched a 'Why I Study Politics' transition project, which tasked students with undertaking independent research into a contemporary political of their choosing, with the aim of students utilising the many resources available in the school library and online. We were delighted to read some very thorough and engaging short essays from the students, as well as see how they had made effective use of a wide range of sources in researching their essays. Particularly worthy of commendation are the following students:

- Patrick Daly, who produced an essay exploring the rise and struggles of the French far-right party, Le Front National
- Rowan Lightfoot, who built on class work on the UK's constitution to explore the impact of Covid-19 on the UK's 'quasi-federal' devolution settlement
- George Hall, who utilised polling data very effectively in his analysis of the 2021 parliamentary by-election in Batley and Spen
- Jack Howarth, who wrote on the continued rise of China as a modern superpower
- Toby Matthews, who very quickly produced a very forensic exploration of the effectiveness of the US Senate Armed Forces Committee and its response to the US withdrawal from Afghanistan.
- Evie Fletcher, who produced a historically-informed essay on the constitutional position of same-sex marriage in the US

As a whole, the short essays proved most encouraging for students' continued success in this exciting and dynamic A level.

Well done for "leaving behind the safety of textbooks."

They are about to embark on a further research task, this time it relates to the previous UK elections and



they will carry out presentations on minor UK parties. Some of these students have been watching a BBC series about the Blair and Brown years, which has provided valuable context for them in terms of events that took place during this period since they were so young. However, for the teaching staff, it only feels like yesterday that Blair took that walk up Downing Street with his wife.

Meanwhile, the Year 13 students have been gaining an understanding of how the various branches of US government work prior to starting the topic of Political Ideas. This will provide the theoretical framework for both US and UK politics. Before that happens though, they are consolidating their learning in preparation for their final mock exams; good luck with these.

It is with some relief that there has been a slowing down in the frenetic nature of US Politics with the arrival of a new President. This will allow the students some breathing space to analyse the changes that have taken place under the previous president and to learn the plentiful supply of events that had occurred during President Trump's administration.

Thanks for the students that have assisted me at the Sixth Form Open Evening, it was another busy night and we look forward to seeing these visiting students starting in September.

Two of the students in the Year 13 class have become members of the Senior Committee, one being a head student and the other being a Chair. It is pleasing to see that they have put to use their political skills in order to gain these prestigious positions. I hope they enjoy the taste of power that it brings.

At this time of year our Year 13 students are applying for university places; this year is no different, with some of them embarking on interviews at the most prestigious British universities. We wish them well in their endeavours
