
tion, really pulling together and in many ways becoming stronger as a team.



Pancake Tuesday 16 Febraury 2021

Pancake Day, or Shrove Tuesday, is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent – the 40 days leading up to Easter – was traditionally a time of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call people to confession. This came to be called the "Pancake Bell" and is still rung today.

Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday, so the date varies from year to year and falls between February 3 and March 9. In 2021 Shrove Tuesday will fall on February 16th.

Shrove Tuesday was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients.

A pancake is a thin, flat cake, made of batter and fried in a frying pan. A traditional English pancake is very thin and is served immediately. Golden syrup or lemon juice and caster sugar are the usual toppings for pancakes.

Ingredients

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 pinch salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar ((optional))
- 2 large eggs
- 1 1/4 cup whole milk

Traditional pancake method

Place the flour into a large mixing bowl and form it into a well.Break in the eggs and stir them into the flour.Add the milk and mix to form a smooth and consistent batter.

Heat the frying pan, then reduce the temperature. Melt enough butter to cover the base of the frying pan.Pour two ladlefuls of batter into the frying pan and swirl it around to make it flat and even.

Ensure your pancake is unstuck and give it a flamboyant flip to cook on the other site.

Serve immediately with lemon and sugar or the topping of your choice.

I WENT TO HGS AND NOW I AM...

I left HGS in 2008 and went to study medicine at the University of Leeds, completing an intercalated degree alongside my MBChB. I moved to North Wales for my first couple of years as a foundation doctor where worked in a range of specialities. I spent a year working in New Zealand in a variety of different medical and surgical specialities and a year travelling through Asia and South America. I then came back to the UK and completed my first couple of years of anoesthetic training in Liverpool. I am now currently working as a clinical fellow back in North Wales. My current position as a clinical fellow in North Wales involves 40% of my time working in anaesthetics, 40% working in the intensive care unit and 20% pre-hospital which involves flying with EMRTS (Emergency Medical Retrieval and Transfer Service) in Wales. 


