
Go Ape, Temple Newsome, proved to be the perfect venue where five coach loads of HGS students and staff arrived on what was one of the hottest days of the year.

Subject Focus - Religious Education

The Religious Education department would like to wish Year 11 and Year 13 students, who have recently sat their final assessments, the very best of luck. These assessments are the culmination of years of the students' dedication and hard work, and we hope that their achievements surpass the excellent results of previous years, enabling them to pursue whatever path they may wish to in the future.

While years 11 and 13 have completed their respective courses, studies continue as normal throughout the rest of the school. At Key Stage 3, Year 7 students continue to explore the major world faiths, the lessons furnishing students with a greater appreciation for the religious diversity present in the UK and the rest of the world.

Students learn not only about the religious practices of each faith but also how faith can affect a person's thoughts and behaviour, the notion being that such understanding will help students develop empathy for those around them and furnish them with the prerequisite knowledge and understanding to begin studying ethical theory in Year 8.



Year 8 students have now completed their study of Ethics, having investigated how Situation Ethicists, Utilitarian and Virtue Ethicists, amongst others, make moral decisions. They are now studying logic, gaining a greater understanding of how arguments are structured and created, and also how religion is presented by the media.

At GCSE, Year 9 students have recently finished their study of the Marriage and the Family topic, which ended with investigation, discussion and debate about gender prejudice and discrimination. Year 10 students, meanwhile, are currently studying Crime and Punishment, particularly the various aims of punishment and whether Britain's attitude to punishing criminals is as effective as that of other countries. It is brilliant to see young people putting their critical thinking and analytical skills to use when discussing topics such as these; on a daily basis the students show that they're capable of sophisticated reasoning and that they care about issues that affect them and every other citizen of the UK.

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Finally, in Year 12, students have begun their study of the Problem of Evil. Having completed an in-depth study of the philosophical arguments that lead to belief in God, students have moved on to exploring the arguments that convince people God does not exist. Students are currently debating whether there could be valid reasons for God allowing the pain and suffering that people experience.

Heckmondwike Grammar School students have greatly impressed the staff of the RE department with their resilience and continued efforts to learn. We would like to thank and congratulate them all for their dedication.

Sociology is the study of human societies, their interactions, and the processes that preserve and change them.


