
Sporting Star Of The Future

Year 9 Business Projects

At the end of Year 9, students have the opportunity to participate in Business projects where they get to apply their learning from throughout the past year.

This year classes are taking part in the cereal project. The students, working in groups, need to develop a new cereal aimed at a target market of their choice. In deciding this, the group need to carry out some research before creating a market map to spot a gap in the market. Once a gap is found, they need to decide who their target market is before creating a product that will meet their needs.

Each member of the group has to design the cereal box considering how best to appeal to their customers.



Once the products have been agreed and the cereal boxes created, the group have to develop the rest of the marketing mix in order to attract their customer. This includes considering the price they want to charge, where they are going to sell the new product and finally developing a promotional campaign aimed specifically at the target market. Students get the opportunity to demonstrate their creative flair by creating a slogan and a TV advert as well as any additional promotional material where they feel is appropriate.

The project is excellent at allowing students to discover how the theories they have learned about in Business work in practise. It also provides the opportunity for students to work in groups developing teamwork, communication, problem solving and presentation skills.





Year 12





It is an exciting time for students who get the opportunity to see where businesses are able to implement strategy effectively as well as discuss businesses who fail because of poor strategic directions.



Manage your Library Account with My Cirqa




