
Badminton Success

Again, many of the activities were only possible if the groups worked as a team making sure everyone conquered.






School Councils

Service of Remembrance - November 12th

Musa Lala, Ethan Hall, George Webster and Basim Khajwal made up the team of four for the maths challenge. With around 30 teams at the event there was stiff competition at the regional heats in York. The competition is composed of three rounds, a group round, a cross-number round and a mini-relay round. The first round involved ten questions which the teams have 40 minutes to solve.

In the second round (cross number round) students work in pairs to solve a mathematical crossword puzzle in approximately 40 minutes. One pair is given the across clues, the other pair the down clues; they cannot confer with the other pair and have record their answer on a shared grid (each correct number is awarded a point). We made excellent progress on the cross number round dropping only 3 marks out of a potential 60 marks; finishing in the top five at that stage of the competition.

In the final round (the shuttle round) the team split into two pairs, A and B. The answer to the A question is needed by the other pair in the B question order to solve the next question which then in turn provides an answer to be used in the next. Sadly a couple of mistakes in the first questions cost the team dearly and we finished sixth overall on the day. Despite the slight disappointment the team performed really well and were a credit to the school.

Enterprise Competition

Run in conjunction with the Tech Partnership, the #techgoals competition challenges school students from years 5 to 8 to create an app that could benefit the local community. Students work in teams to create, refine and visualise their idea, helping to develop their interpersonal skills as they advance their digital competence. The drive reflects research that shows that young people are motivated by the idea of using tech to help others or change the world for the better.



The entries were of an extremely high quality and the competition attracted talented students and aspiring digital learners from across the Leeds City Region. The judges were busy over the summer term scoring entries from across the region, and **William Stone** won the competition for Best Secondary entry, with his 'Sign and Speak App.' All winning entries were scored by the Tech Partnership and endorsed by Kersten England, Lead for Business Growth and Innovation in the Leeds City Region and Chief Executive at Braford Council, and Glynn Robinson, Managing Director at BJSS, a Digital Employer in the region. Judges' comments for the winning entry were as follows:

William D Stone - Sign and Speak App

"This is a lovely concept. It's acknowledging the challenges faced by Deaf and hard of hearing people. It also comes with an app prototype, and the PowerPoint nicely explains the look and feel. Well done! A clear understanding of how digital can be used for the wider good."

The competition forms part of a wider #techgoals programme run by Leeds City Region LEP and Tech Partnership, offering schools in the region access to a range of high-quality teaching resources, all designed to develop students' skills and confidence in technology. The Leeds City Region is home to a number of high profile employers who are keen to employ digitally skilled people, so the programme is enthusiastically supported by local businesses.

That afternoon as a thank you the school children put on a performance showing all the talents that the children had in the school, including some Sri Lankan dancing and various musical instruments. The children also made us all a card and a snowman from papier-mâché. We also did a small presentation on what life is like in the UK, and we gave them a further donation into the school's first computer which was a huge help in improving the school.
