<u>Iceland 2019</u>



On arrival in Iceland first on the list, was to visit Pingvellir National Park to see the rift at in-between the American and Eurasian Tectonic plates, and learned that they are moving away from each other at a rate of 2mm a year, then moving on to see the hot-mud pots and geothermal hot springs at Gunnuhver (which smelled like rotten eggs due to the sulphur). During the trip to Snaefellsnes Peninsular cave, we stopped in one of the largest rooms of the cave, turned off all our torches. stood very quietly, listened to all the water dripping down through the tiny holes in the rock, and then shouted very loudly. Later we travelled from the lava tubes to a shark museum, stopping to see beautiful costal formations and cascading waterfalls along the way. There, we learned all about



the Greenland Shark: what it eats, where it lives and how it is essentially blind. However, what came next was the worst part of the trip – eating rotten shark! It was vile!! First, they had to catch one. Then, they cut it up and left it to ferment until all the toxic urea was gone, and then it was hung in the open air under a shelter for ages. The smell was horrific.

Although the students had to battle against the strong icy winds, climb 400 stair to viewing areas deal with local customs (Eating rotten shark) the trip was enjoyed by all, the only downside was on arrival at the airport we scanned all our passports, sent our suitcases through, went through security, waited at the gate and boarded the plane. 20 minutes later than we were meant to set off, the pilot came on the announcer, and said that the engine was experiencing technical difficulties. Half an hour later, the pilot came on again and said that the data from the engine had been sent to an engineering company in Singapore! 20 minutes after that, he came on for a third time and said that the Singaporean team weren't happy that we would be safe to fly, so we all had to disembark. They said they had to fly a new plane out from the UK, and that the delay would be almost 7 hours. However, it was okay, as we had each other for company and were given £20 worth of vouchers to spend in the food shop – so it wasn't all bad.

It later turned out that the problem with the engine was a bird.
