Department Focus: Geography


'May you live in interesting times' is a Chinese curse which resonates today. The start to the year has been fraught to say the least but we are now getting to grips (mostly) with the changes to teaching. The geography department is delivering lessons to those unable to attend wherever possible and maintaining as high a standard as possible.

In key stage 3, year 7 and 8 have been getting to grips with understanding the UK and looking at how our industry is structured as we try to give them a better understanding of how we fit into the

wider world post Brexit. Looking at the British Isles and Industry respectively. Did you know that Nissan produced 507,444 cars in 2016?

We continue to develop this awareness throughout Key stage 4 through the delivery of the GCSE. Year 9 are currently working on ecosystems looking in detail at Tropical rain forests and Deserts and how these two ecosystems are experiencing a range of threats from tourism and mineral extraction to climate change. Did you know the Penjom Gold mine is the largest in Malaysia producing 100,000 oz of Gold?

Year 10 are learning about the UK coastline and how waves and rivers alter the geography of our country and how climate change is adding to the threat. We are studying the nature of managing such a diverse landscape and



that there is no panacea when dealing with the problems. Did you know that Medmerry is the largest managed realignment scheme on the open coast in Europe?

Year 11 who will have just finished their mock exams are studying global economics and how divided the world is economically and socially. We are about to start looking at how countries like Nigeria attempt to catch higher income countries up through investing in its human capital ie. Its people. Did you know that Nollywood is the world's second largest producer of films in the world?



Year 12 are dividing their time between learning how cities work in this post-industrial world' how cities attempt to solve the problems of deprivation and dereliction and steer themselves through this economically challenging times. They are also studying the global distribution of the world's water and carbon and how these stores

change day to day and over the last 600 million years. Did you know that our entire planet was covered with snow and ice 600 million years ago known as Snowball Earth?

Year 13 are taking on the world's Hazards attempting to understand their causes and impacts on ourselves. They are also learning about the plight of our indigenous people who migrate across the tundra of Siberia and Alaska while Russia and the USA are trying to extract the resources beneath their feet. Did you know the worlds reindeer population has declined by 60% in the last two decades as a result of climate change?

The world is changing at an exponential rate economically, politically, socially and environmentally and we live within a cascading system where all these interact with one another. We in geography attempt to equip our students with an understanding and ability to deal with these 'interesting times'. If you ever wonder where Geography can take you, this is the future.

Just one Gold award – for Ellis Speight in Year 12, who was also best in School.



Ambitious law student Haris Article from scoops award

A BATLEY-BORN law student with ambitions to run his own firm has won a Yorkshire Asian Young Achiever of the Year award.

Haris Rashid, 22, of Staincliffe, studies law at university in Liverpool and became the first South Asian president of the Student Union.

Haris, who has been at Liverpool Hope University for four years, said he was "over the moon" to win the award for achievement in education.

The award is something to be really proud of," he said. "I'm just a lad from Batley and I hope I can encourage and motivate other young people. If I can do it so can anyone else."

Haris, who comes from a British-Kashmiri heritage, added: "It's great to see people from black and ethnic minority communities achieving, and they are usually under-represented in professional roles."

Haris, an only child, grew up on a Staincliffe council estate and attended Staincliffe Junior School and Batley Grammar School.

He demonstrated early academic promise by becoming the youngest national achiever of the OCR exam qualification, and was presented with the award by Lord Adonis.

He studied A-levels at Heckmondwike Grammar School and developed a passion for the

Now in his final year he had a sabbatical last year after being elected president of the Student

"I hope to go into commercial law and would love to set up my own practice - but one step at a time," said Haris.

Asked if he would return to his hometown, he said: "Batley will always be my home and I never want to be too far away.

"I might move down south for a couple of years to meet new people but I'll never forget my

Batley roots."

The announcement of the awards was delayed by the Covid-19 pandemic and Haris admitted he was taken by sur-
