

Year 11 have also been studying how businesses use organisational charts as part of the Human Resources topic.




Figure 3: Organisational Charts in action






We have had to mention this on several occasions previously and feel that this needs to be brought parents/carers attention once again.




Development meeting at the Tom, Dick and Harry design studio






