


Year 11 Class of 2021

House Maths



The tasks were made even harder by the fact that students were split across different rooms, so had to communicate using Teams to work through the challenges.



The online challenges were created by Mrs Jarvis in the Maths department, showcasing the extent to which IT can be used to create new and innovative resources!

Subject Focus: Sociology

The Yr13 Sociologists have now left having completed their end of year assessment, after what has been a very strange year. We wish them all the best. They will have plenty of spare time on their hands in which to carry out some sociology in the form of “people watching.” Here they can employ the skills of Interpretivist sociologists and observe the world like a professional stranger; preferably from the comfort of a café table and try and understand the meanings and motives of strangers.

Another opportunity that the students have to learn other areas of Sociology is through the Supra curriculum via Universities. So for example, the University of East Anglia are offering students access to lessons. One is entitled “Racism, poverty, power and prestige collide in Education” here the students can learn about the experiences of Black South Africans at prestigious South African universities. It involves a ‘Mixed’ race female student studying at a prestigious ‘White’ university in South Africa. The words, “Sorry, you’re not ‘Black’ enough” painfully alerted me to the domineering presence of institutional racism at the University of Cape Town (UCT), a prestigious university which customarily reserved access for ‘White’, affluent and international students. Dr Carlene Cornish.

Closer to home, they have a course entitled ‘Mothers on Display: Lunchboxes, Social Class and Moral Accountability’. Here they can learn about how mothers feel about their mothering skills being on display through their children’s lunch boxes and what it means to be a “good mother” and the influence of government policy relating to healthy food. It will also investigate how identities are shaped by social class, gender and parenting. Food for thought.



There are a whole range of these types of topics offered through universities and also on the Radio 4 programme “Thinking Allowed.” Students will be able to experience a broader range of knowledge and a deeper understanding of Sociology by engaging with these resources which leave behind the confines of textbooks. We would recommend that the students have a go at these alternative resources in order to bring the subject alive.

Meanwhile, the Yr12’s will shortly be embarking on a revision programme in preparation for their mock examinations. Once this has been completed they will be starting the Yr13 curriculum which I know they are looking forward to. They have done fantastically well to “stay on target” this year and we are optimistic that they can build on this success next year.

Young Musician Hits a High Note

In March 2020, when I was year 6 and the first lockdown started, I used a website called Oak National Academy and decided to do a random music lesson, as I was currently playing piano and was a member of the Boys' Junior Choir in Leeds, and this lesson was on composition.

After completing this lesson, I showed my choral director (Miss Lucy Haigh, big thanks to her) and she suggested writing a mass (multiple pieces of music) for the choir I was currently in: The Leeds Diocese Boys' Junior Boys Choir.

I started on a piece called a Kyrie, then a Gloria, Sanctus then Agnus Dei, all religious pieces of music that are written in Latin, that eventually would all be performed professionally.

My mass needed a name, it would have to be Latin and relate to something currently happening. When I was writing this piece, sadly we were at the beginning of the first Covid-19 lockdown, so I decided to call my mass "Missa Spei" which is Latin for Mass – Missa Of Hope – Spei, because hope was a key factor of the lockdown.

These four pieces were the first pieces of music I had ever composed, so I required a bit of help, so my choral director asked another professional composer for help, once again great thanks to them both.

So, on Christmas Eve my Kyrie, Sanctus and Agnus Dei were all performed in Saint Anne's Cathedral and put on the internet, and my Gloria is soon to be performed.

In the future I would like to improve my musical ability and compose more music, as it was an amazing experience.

He has really enjoyed the role of mayor and we enjoyed meeting him.






London Eye Mystery is about a boy called Ted, his sister Kat and their cousin Salim, who mysteriously vanishes of the face of the Earth in 30 minutes. Ted has Asperger syndrome, which makes it harder for Ted to connect with people's feelings, and the story being narrated from his perspective helps the reader in understanding how he perceives different scenarios compared to others. I found it quite interesting as to how a boy with a brain that is different to a normal person's brain, managed to work out where Salim was, using just plain facts, which would have been time taking for a normal person to do on their own. I liked this book because the author built up the suspense until it seemed as if they were never going to find Salim. The plot was very intriguing and exciting, with twists and turns at every key point in the story. It keeps you hooked and leaves you wanting for more afterwards. This book showed me that sometimes differences in yourself are also gifts as well, which enable you to do some things that others may not be able to accomplish easily.
