In a poignant speech, Jo's sister, Kim, spoke eloquently about Jo's personality and connection to the school, as well as the enduring



legacy of her moral and political values, which are best encapsulated in the now-famous line that holds pride of place among a series of wall displays in the Centre: 'we have more

## Department Focus: Psychology

The success story of the Psychology Department continued this summer as we celebrated some of our most impressive ever exam results. The department and all of our teachers are immensely proud of all of our students who graduated from school last summer, 62% of whom achieved A\*-B grades and 90% of whom achieved A\*-C! We were thrilled to share in their excitement on results day but not surprised as they really did show that hard work, dedication and enthusiasm are the keys to success.

We are just as excited about our current crop of A Level Psychologists who are showing every sign of being able to reach those same heights. This term has seen our year 12 Psychology students becoming practically involved in their introduction to Research Methods by eating chocolate. They investigated whether or not chocolate aids memory and guess what, based on our results, it does!! That's good news for chocolate lovers. Students have also considered the ethical issues surrounding experiments in Psychology, particularly Stanley Milgram's use of electric shocks to highlight levels of obedience to authority (back in 1963 before Ethical Guidelines were in place).

Our Year 13s have begun their final year with the chance to become specialised in some of the influencers and drivers of human behaviour. A topic on aggression has seen students study famous figures of the past such as the Kray twins as well as tragic contemporary events like the Columbine Massacre to unpick what motivates those who commit atrocities. Students have also evaluated the impact of prison on prisoners to see if they are more influenced by the personality they bring into incarceration or of the experiences they have behind bars. This is complemented well by a unit of study about brain and behaviour which delves into just how much our actions are determined from birth or whether they are affected by the lives we lead. Ask one of our Year 13 students if you would like to know the answers!

The Psychology department is brimming with pride and passion this academic year and are excited for the successes of our students in the future. How can a group of students so knowledgeable about how humans learn and what motivates us, fail to be fully revised, ready and motivated for success in the summer? Psychologists would have the answer!





### Arthur Miller's The Crucible

On Friday 25 January, Mrs Hellewell's year 10 GCSE drama class performed their version of Arthur Miller's classic play 'The Crucible' to a full audience.
