Department Focus: PE

This summer term is a very busy one for the Department.

In curriculum time, pupils complete blocks of activities in athletics, cricket, rounders, softball and tennis. The school has excellent facilities with four tennis courts and the astro turf which is used for kwik cricket, rounders and softball. Up at Cawley fields, there is an eight lane 400m track, throwing areas for shot, javelin, discus and a long jump pit. Four rounders pitches are also used on the lower playing fields.

There is also a range of extra-curricular clubs, house competitions and district/county competitions. This summer cricket teams from Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 have competed in the Yorkshire County cricket 20/20 competitions, with the U13 and U15 teams reaching the semi final stages.
