Green Week commenced on Monday 28 March and we were very lucky to be accompanied by four guest speakers from Monday to Thursday.

The talks started with a visit from Forge Recycling – the company that provides the school's recycling service (greatly improving our Eco Schools Waste and Litter targets). We had an



excellent turnout from all year groups, and enjoyed a really insightful talk – titled Where does our Food Waste go?

On Tuesday, we were visited by Matt Edwards - the Green Party's representative for Bradford. This was the workshop with an incredible turnout of 63 students and lots of teachers too! Students listened to an interesting presentation regarding the Green Party's work in Bradford, as well as Matt's role as a councillor. Students were then presented with the opportunity to ask questions and it

was brilliant to hear all the thoughtful questions prepared.

Wednesday lunchtime focused on Careers, and we are very grateful to Claire and Jade – our in school Careers Advisors for jumping in at the last minute and preparing a presentation on Green Careers. Students reported that it was "informative, inspiring and useful" as it focused on a range of careers linked to sustainability and environmental sciences.

Thursday was our final day of talks and we were lucky enough to take part in a Teams call

with The World Land Trust. We were visited by Hannah Nutt – Donor Relations Manager for the WLT, who talked us through the charity's approach to conservation and protection. We looked at their current work with Operation Ocelot that works to protect the Atlantic Forest, Brazil. It was an engaging workshop, and once again students were able to ask some thoughtful questions. At the end, we were able to tell Hannah about our work with Eco Schools, and she informed us of some more opportunities that we plan to get involved in.

On behalf of the Eco Committee, we would like to thank our guest speakers for getting involved with Green Week and for providing some exciting and informative talks. We would also like to congratulate all of the students that came to the workshops, for their excellent behaviour and amazing questions!



Finally, Green Week ended with a Bake Sale – run by Year 9 students Amelie, Eva and Abby. These students baked all the items themselves and managed to raise an incredible £50, which the Eco Committee is planning to use to buy some rainforest with!

The Eco Committee is also planning to take part in some tree planting after the Easter Break – organised by Mrs Power. We have 15 trees from the Woodland Trust, which we are planting on school grounds by the MUGA. New members are always welcome and we are very thankful for the ongoing support by students attending the Eco Committee, and look forward to continuing our sustainability journey in school!

Subject focus - Geography

The Geography department has been working hard with the Ecoschools group to improve awareness on a variety of environmental targets. Waste, litter and Global Citizenship are our chosen topics and we have been busy over the last few weeks preparing for the first ever Green Week. The week started with an assembly by Martha Currie and Olivia Smith who introduced the event to Year 7, Martha and Olivia then presented the assembly to the different year groups throughout the week. We also invited guest



speakers to come and deliver a talk to groups from across the year groups. The talks included representatives from Forge Recycling on what happens to our food waste, Matt Edwards from the Green Party and the politics of the environment, our very own Mrs Lawler who stepped in to deliver a talk on Sustainable courses and employment opportunities, and finally a Teams talk from Hannah Nutt from the World Land Trust who talked to us about the range of projects that the organisation supports throughout the world. The talks were a great success and were attended by

60 pupils and students each day.



To complete the Green Week we gathered in the lesser Hall on Tuesday to collect for local charities. We collected food and household items, and clothes and we conducted a book swap where students could bring a book and take a book which proved very popular.

I would like to thank everyone who took part either preparing for, helping out over the week, delivering the form activities or donating items for Tuesday's collection. The students from our

Eco-Committee have been brilliant and have worked tirelessly preparing, delivering, inviting and just making things happened. We can be very proud of what we have achieved and now look forward to new initiatives next term to help us to reach our goal of 100 points or more to achieve the Green Flag Award.



Gold Practice DofE Expedition: 1 – 4 April 2022



It must mean that Summer is on its way if it is Expedition season once again. Well Hopefully!

The group headed for Coniston YHA on Friday after school so the group could have the evening to prepare before starting their expedition on Saturday morning.

After a large, cooked breakfast at the Youth Hostel they started their expedition from the shores of Coniston. The route on Day 1 was to take them round the lake to Coniston village, up to Tarn Hows, over to Little Langdale and then

onto Great Langdale campsite at the far end of the valley. It was a cold day but the sun was shining. The group walked well throughout the day and were superb with their timings, arriving at the checkpoints exactly when they said they would. They were tired on reaching the campsite but were in good spirits. They pitched their tents and cooked their tea and as darkness fell the

temperature dropped rapidly. Clear skies meant amazing stars but they were still early to bed to escape the cold.

There was frost on the tents on Day 2 when they woke but it was another glorious sunny day. They got packed up and ready to leave. This was done fairly slowly as they were suffering a little after a cold night but, they were still ready to leave by 9am. Day 2's route went from the campsite down to Elterwater via a craggy climb and then over to the campsite at Low Wray. Despite this not being a particularly



difficult route they had found it quite tricky at points due to the high number of fallen trees they had to navigate after the storms back in December. However, again their timings were accurate,



and they arrived at the campsite with plenty of time to get settled, pitch tents and enjoy a hot shower. The drizzly rain that started at about 8.30 meant for another early night but at least it also meant that it wasn't quite as cold overnight.

The forecast for Day 3 was rain and wind so we were all surprised when we woke to find a still morning and that the overnight rain had cleared away. The group packed up

a little quicker this morning and were ready to depart before 8.30am. Their route took them up to the top of Latterbarrow before descending via Moss Eccles Tarn to Far Sawrey and on to the shores of Lake Windermere. They did well to arrive at the top of Latterbarrow before 10.30am despite again having to navigate fallen trees and from then on, their navigation was strong to the finish.

Well Done to the group who dealt with blisters, tired legs, a lack of sleep and cold weather to survive their practice expedition. They learnt a lot and will be off again in the second week of the Easter holidays on their Qualifying Expedition.
