### Subject Focus - Biology

#### Year 7 get creepy....and then crawly.

That's right, this week year 7 have been study the behavioural adaptations of some very creepy crawlies (you might have heard the screams from some of the students from the top floor of the Crelin building).

The idea behind this was not just to encourage our students to be curious about the microworld that surrounds them but also to show them how different organisms respond to a change in their habitat.

The woodlouse were offered a variety of chambers to move to, each with a different environmental condition, light & dry, dark & dry, light & damp and dark & damp. By looking at which chamber the woodlouse chose the students were better able to understand how the adaptations of their bodies influenced their behaviour. With this knowledge, we encourage our students to set up bug hotels in their green spaces to encourage biodiversity in the area.

#### **UKMT Junior Mathematics Challenge**

This year all year 8 students participated in the UKMT Individual Junior Mathematics Challenge. We had record success with 51 students achieving a Bronze certificate, 78 achieving a Silver certificate and 45 students achieving a Gold certificate.

So far, I have been to 1 in person meeting during the Easter Holidays. The Board's main job is to help advise Save the Children on projects they've started or on issues they want young people's insight on.

This summer Jane Bailey (Biology teacher) is leading a team of female adventurers on a hike across the UK this summer.

From Lands' End to John O'Groats, the Womens' End2End Relay is a 2,028km hike over more than 36,000m of elevation through some of the country's incredible wild spaces.

Jane is part of the all-female team of qualified hill and mountain leaders who are leading the trek.

She has always loved the outdoors and when this opportunity arose to help other women gain the same sense of adventure and achievement she decided to volunteer. The section Jane is leading is approximately 150km over 5 days through Northumberland and the Scottish Borders. This will be challenging and stunning in equal measures.

The relay is being organised by Love Her Wild, a women's only adventure company, and it will launch at the UK's most south-westerly point on Thursday, June 16, and finish 74 days later at the most northerly point. The relay was originally planned for 2020 but had to be postponed due to the pandemic.

Love Her Wild, whose tagline is "we believe every woman deserves an adventure", was founded in 2017 and has grown to a community of more than 30,000 women, connecting women in the UK and organising expeditions all over the world. The Women's End2End Relay, which is sponsored by retailer Ellis Brigham Mountain Sports, route planning app Komoot, and the Royal Air Force, is going to be their most ambitious team adventure yet.

Founder Bex Band said: "By putting together this exciting team relay, we hope to encourage more women across the UK to get outdoors, exploring our country's incredible wild spaces. Adventures build confidence, forge new friendships and help women realise their true potential."

If you would like to help carry the baton, or you can help the team by offering lifts, bringing cake and hot drinks en route, or putting team members up for a night, you can sign up on the Love her wild website. It costs £25 to sign up for one day, and all money raised from the relay will go to support UK based conservation work carried out by Woodland Trust.

The baton has been carved from a piece of locally sourced birch wood. Its design was created by Florentina Curphey (aged 10) following a competition for girls across the UK to design the baton.

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
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
