### INTRODUCTION

Our challenging and varied A-level course covers the revolutionary contexts of 17th-century Britain and early 20th-century Russia, before going on to explore civil rights and race relations in the United States, from the Civil War until the election of Barack Obama. Students are able to refine skills of close reading, critical evaluation, independent thought and reasoned academic argument that transfer to a range of degrees and employment opportunities.

#### WHAT TO BRING FOR YOUR FIRST LESSON

In History you will need to come prepared to write! Eventually you will need at least 2 lever arch folders, for each side of the course, but initially, one ring-binder or lever-arch type folder will suffice. A notebook of lined paper will also be useful and file organizing equipment such as plastic pockets and dividers.

# CLASSWORK, HOMEWORK AND INDEPENDENT STUDY

Lessons will include reading, group discussion, source analysis and evaluation, class debate, and assessment for learning (essential exam technique). You will generally be set some homework every lesson. The work will usually be 'flipped' and essential course content – 'core notes' -







will be completed between lessons and followed up by discussion, deeper study and assessment in class.
