Challenge. The following pupils deserve to have their achievements acknowledged:


Bhoomie Marathe and Saatchi Shah, both in year 8


achieved a Merit certificate for their scores within their respective Intermediate age group.

Subject Focus - Sociology

Sociology is the study of human societies, their interactions, and the processes that preserve and change them.

Read on to find out how students studying Sociology at Heckmondwike Grammar School learn the captivating knowledge from these interesting subjects, achieve exceptional levels of academic success and develop the skills to become the social scientists of the future to advocate for a better world centred around the people and societies we all delight in.





Congratulations to our Year 12 students who have completed their first full term of A Level Sociology! The hard work and resilience students have shown in adapting to the demands of studying this new and fascinating subject at an advanced level has been remarkable. Keep up the good work!

Well done to our Year 13 students who have completed the first mock exams of year 13 and are now working hard to prepare for the next mock exams in February. We look forward to celebrating your success in March!

Many Year 11 students engaged in the Sociology lesson experience during the Year 11 Taster Day. Students learned about religious cults such as the Peoples Temple where thousands died in the Jonestown tragedy. Students consider how the charismatic leader of the cult Jim Jones was able to take advantage of social inequality on the basis of class, gender and ethnicity to drive the





Year 11 students also explored the role of nature and nurture in society. Looking at the case of feral child Oxana Malaya who was raised by dogs. They considered the role of secondary socialisation in

These interesting examples of sociology may initially appear removed from the everyday experiences of society. After all, few people are raised by dogs or join religious cults! However, on closer inspection the importance of these area in understanding society is clear. Recognising how people of different gender, class, ethnicity and age are influenced by society and interact with society is critical to many careers. For example, employers are currently seeking sociology graduates in fields as diverse as technology companies such as Google to product design in manufacturing to civil engineering. These areas of business all benefit from the key insight into how different groups in society may interact with the products designed in that industry. No wonder sociology graduates are in such high demand!

Subject Focus - Sociology continued

Year 12 students have been learning about the personal life perspective in the family and households topic. From this perspective, sociologists should define family life from the perspective of the individual. This would include pets as family members if the individual defines them as such. Students have been looking at a specific



example of a family where the children of the two families are related through egg donation. This family refer to the children as 'diblings' (donor siblings).



Meanwhile in the education topic, the Marxist perspective on the role of education in perpetuating inequality has been motivating students into political activism to address the class divide in educational performance.



Year 13 students have been using the Chivalry Thesis to account for gender differences in crime and deviance. The thesis proposes that female criminals receive more lenient treatment in the criminal justice system and news coverage of their crimes than their male counterparts






Subject Focus - Sociology continued

In the beliefs topics students have been using advances in science and technology to explain the surge in non-religious beliefs in the 2021 Census. 'No-religion' saw an increase of 12 percentage points from 2011 to 2021. Students have also been considering the leading nature of the question 'What is your religion?' framing the question in a way that encourages a religious response and how this may indicate the non-religious figure is in fact much higher. Contrasting reports of an increase in religiosity in the younger population have also been explored as a response to the difficulties faced by the younger generation during the pandemic. Year 13 are clearly demonstrating their ability to use



research evidence to analyse the social world around them.



Student Plea for Help



As a direct result of donations made by parents in the past twenty years, your child now benefits from an excellent sports hall, a new performing arts studio and a multi-use games area (MUGA). In the last few years we have been able to:. Refurbish and re-equip our Library Resources area;

- Convert classrooms to science labs;
- Build and equip an innovative drama studio;
- Install a wireless network and invest in iPad devices;
- Create and furnish a new classroom block; and
- Replace windows and make for safety improvements

Our enlarged and remodeled Sixth Form Centre building using donations and grant funding, (opened late 2018) named the Jo Cox Centre after the late Batley and Spen MP, offers excellent study and social facilities for our sixth form students.

We are eager to continue to improve our facilities and would appreciate your help to fund this improvement activity.

Gift Aid

Because we have charitable status, one of the most effective ways of giving to our fundraising is by making use of the Gift Aid scheme. Anyone who is a UK taxpayer can sign a declaration, which allows the school to reclaim an equivalent amount of tax paid on the contributions. This is currently 25p for every £1 given and costs the donor nothing.

Examples of regular donations:

- £10 per month = £120 pa + £30 = £150 per year incl. reclaimed tax from Gift Aid
- £15 per month = £180 pa + £45 = £225 per year incl. reclaimed tax from Gift Aid

Each year if half of our new parents were able to make the lower donation, with gift aid, we would raise an additional £78,750 over the next five years!




