After much deliberation, the panel decided to award second place to Sahasra Vundavalli (12P1) for the creative use of typography which cleverly incorporates '125' into the school's motto,

First place was split between two of our key stage three students: Ivan Spencer (7H2) and Thomas Cliffe (8B1). Our panel of judges simply could not decide which of the two entries should be awarded first place. As such, Ivan and Thomas were declared joint winners and their submissions will be sent to a professional design agency to create a final pin badge



that incorporates and celebrates elements of both concepts.

We eagerly await the final design before 2000 copies of the crest are made into commemorative keepsakes for our students and staff.

#### Update on the Terrence Higgins Trust Fundraiser and LGBT History





As you may recall, last half-term on the 3rd of February, the LGBTQ+ Society held a fundraiser for a leading charity in the UK, The Terrence Higgins Trust (THT). This marked the beginning of LGBT History month at HGS, which was been continued within the society.

On the day, we sold materials including red ribbons to show solidarity with AIDS victims as well as the THT logo pins and stickers in exchange for a donation. Those that contributed were incredibly

generous and we are so thankful at the support and respect shown from staff and students alike.

We raised a total of £67.84! This is huge as we were hoping for £50, and the event was entirely student organised and ran with the help of SLT members where necessary. I would like to thank our volunteers primarily for their efforts and enthusiasm in this event – it would not have been possible without them! They remained resilient after setbacks due to postal delays.


