It was an early start for Junior Choir on the morning of Sunday 5 March as we met at Colne Valley High School. It is a fantastic opportunity for students to perform outside of school, to a wider audience and also to receive feedback from independent judges. Many other ensembles were playing

### **Subject Focus - Economics and Business**

The headlines, as I write, tell us just how much the world of Economics and Business affects our daily lives. The cost of living continues to cause concern and real hardship.

Price increases of staple, essential items such as eggs, milk and margarine are driving grocery price inflation to 17%. Our Y12 and Y13 Economists will be able to explain how the basket of goods that we buy on average has risen by hundreds of pounds in the last 12 months alone. What will happen to energy prices next month when the price cap is due to end on 1st April?

As for markets working (or failing) we have shortages of fruit and vegetables in the product markets (tomatoes seem to be the media favourite), and strikes occurring in the labour markets as workers in numerous industries protest about falling real wages and working conditions. These are all good topics for conversation and debate in class, in the corridors and at home.

All of our Y9 Business classes are starting a marketing research project this half term using the ICT rooms and school iPads.



All pupils will be able to gain a deeper understanding of this topic by completing a project in small groups over a number of lessons (and homework). Having covered this topic in lessons, this is an opportunity to put what has been learnt into practice. The project supports learning across the whole of the GCSE and we hope that pupils enjoy working in a slightly different way. The final goal is for pupils to present their findings to the rest of the class, with the requirements to evaluate their results and to SHAPE [Sentences, Hands, Articulate, Project, and Eye Contact] their high quality talk.



All the Year 11 and Year 13 Economics and Business students have now completed their second set of mock examinations this school year. Following on from the revision guidance that they all received in January, we hope that their efforts will be rewarded. Some of Y11 can be seen in action in the images – active revision to the fore.


