#### Spanish Trip to Granada - 5-8 June

As a department, we were delighted to be able to run trips again this year. Thirty of our lucky Spanish students have recently returned from a visit to Granada, accompanied by Miss Bowyer, Mrs Bell, Mr Godoy and Mr Whittaker. The majority of these students (26 of them) are in year 9, with the remaining students coming from our year 12 cohort.

Located in the southern Spanish region of Andalusia, Granada is a city steeped in history and is home to the Alhambra. It is a particularly fitting destination for our A-Level students, all of whom study the Alhambra, architecture and cultural heritage as part of the course. The author we study- Federico García Lorca- was also from Granada.



Despite our visit taking place in June, we did experience some rain. This is practically unheard of for Spain at this time of year, though it did not put a dampener on our trip! On our first full day, students visited the Alhambra and the Generalife. A palace and fortress, the Alhambra is one of the most famous examples of Islamic architecture, as well as being a prime example of Spanish Renaissance architecture. In the afternoon, students conducted an adventure quest. They then enjoyed some free time at the Alcaicería market, where many a souvenir was bought.

As many of our students love science, we could not pass up on the opportunity to visit Andalusia's largest interactive science park. Highlights included exhibitions on Artificial Intelligence, Outer Space and Wonders of Wildlife, as well as a trip up the Observation Tower, the third tallest structure in Granada.

We also witnessed a religious procession for Corpus Christi. As students in both year groups study festivals and Spanish customs, it was great to see their studies being brought to life.

#### French Trip to Paris - 9th – 12th June

Just a couple of hours after our Spanish students returned from Granada, 30 of our Year 9 and 12 French students set off on their own visit to Paris, accompanied by Miss Genneviève, Mrs Thomas and Mr Stokoe. We understand that, for some of our students, this was their first ever opportunity to travel abroad.

On Friday, we left Heckmondwike at 4.30 am and enjoyed a trouble-free journey to Paris by coach and ferry. On arrival, we enjoyed a freshly cooked meal, and we settled in our modern, ensuite bedrooms for a well-earned rest after a very long day.









On a bright and sunny Saturday morning, we started the day by visiting the Louvre, the former residence of French Kings, and now the world's largest museum. Our students had previously chosen which section of the museum they wanted to visit, as it is

impossible to see everything in one day. Miss Genneviève's group spent most of their morning admiring Egyptian antiquities, Mrs Thomas led her students to the Louvre's most famous masterpieces (such as the Mona Lisa), whilst Mr Stokoe took his group to the Richelieu wing, where the decorative arts collection is displayed.

By lunchtime, the temperature had risen significantly, and we were pleased to find a shaded spot in the nearby Tuileries gardens, to sit down for a picnic under the trees. One of the highlights of the day was spotting two parrots in the foliage above our heads!







On Saturday afternoon, we walked from the Tuileries gardens alongside the river Seine, before boarding a Bateau-Mouche, for a onehour sightseeing boat trip. We travelled past some most famous Paris' of landmarks, such as the Eiffel Tower and Notre-Dame Cathedral, which is currently being restored to its former glory, after the devastating fire that destroyed its roof in 2019. Our students particularly enthusiastically enjoyed

waving at the locals who were strolled along the riverbank!

Saturday evening was spent enjoying a meal near the Arc De triomphe, followed by a closer look at the Eiffel tower, before driving back to our accommodation, just in time to watch the second half of the Champions League final.

On Sunday morning, our day started with some free time and shopping on the Champs-Élysées, which the French like to refer to as 'the most beautiful avenue in the world'. We climbed up the Arc De Triomphe where we admired the view and spotted some amazing roof-top garden around the Place de l'Étoile. The famous Napoleonic arch is also home to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, which acts as a memorial to all the young men who lost their lives in the two World Wars.

After lunch, we caught a glimpse of the Moulin Rouge on the bus, before walking up

to the picturesque Montmartre Quarter, home of numerous artists past and present. We visited the Sacré-Coeur Basilica, where a religious service was taking place whilst we were walking around the building.



In the evening, after a meal at the La Poutre restaurant, we headed to the 56th floor of the Tour Montparnasse, a skyscraper which offers breathtaking views of the French capital. We were lucky to get back to our coach just in time to avoid a deluge that stayed with us for most of our drive back to the hotel. We were left with enough time to pack our suitcases, ready for our journey back to Heckmondwike on Monday.
