Match reports

Senior football, ESFA Cup v Roundhay.

The senior team faced Roundhay school in the first round of the ESFA U18 national cup with a somewhat depleted squad due to a Duke of Edinburghs Silver expedition. Heckmondwike made a slow start and it was apparent that Roundhay would be very strong opposition. Despite some resilient defending form centres backs Noah chapman and Henry Pollard, keeper Thomas Burton could do little to prevent Roundhay from taking the lead, second and third goals soon followed. Will Brown had Heckmondwike's only chance with a header that was easily saved by the Roundhay keeper. Some tactical and positional changes at half time saw Heckmondwike make a positive start to the second half. Sub Elliot Potter made an instant impact and along with centre midfield team mate Rory Aveyard, they started to gain a grip on the match with more possession in midfield. Totally against the run of play, Roundhays lightning fast striker broke through and netted a fourth. To Heckmondwike's credit, they worked exceptionally hard for the remainder of the match and kept trying to play football despite some robust challenges.

The match finished 4-0 and Heckmondwike will now focus on the West Yorkshire schools league competition when they face Ossett, at home on Tuesday 11 October.

Year 8 Boys football.

The Year 8 squad travelled to face Brooksbank in the ESFA under 13 national cup. This was the teams' first experience of 11 a side and they struggled to maintain possession on a pitch the size of Wembley. Brooksbank raced to a 3-0 lead despite some fantastic saves by Keeper Yash Ahuja. Oliver Binns, Oliver Crawshaw and Toby Onigbogi battled tirelessly in midfield and combined well with winger Tom Ingram to create some half chances that

were not converted. Heckmondwike had an improved second half performance but were caught out on the counter attack conceding a fourth. Some good performances from the team who demonstrated a lot of potential for the future. Their next match is against BBG in the Spen Valley cup competition.


Leigha Blanchard


Caitlyn Hodgson


Ismaeel Karolia






