As ever, Remembrance Day was a very moving experience at Heckmondwike Grammar school, where we paid our respects to all those who had lost their lives in conflict from the world wars to the present day.



Year based assemblies were held in school where we paid our respects to the 67 former students of the school who have lost their lives in conflict. The assemblies were spine tingling, with Eleanor Turner and Kyran Russel playing Elgar's Nimrod, Enigma Variation on the violin and piano and Lily Dillon playing the Last Post and Reveille beautifully on the trumpet. Wreaths were laid by our uniformed service cadets.

Later in the day, the School Council students attended a memorial service in Heckmondwike Green Park for local school children.

On Sunday, the school band had the honour of accompanying the hymns at the public service in Heckmondwike, with Lily again being the trumpeter and our Head Boy and Head Girl, Rowan Lightfoot and Chandni Pahal, laying a wreath and delivering a reading.

Silver DofE Qualifying Expedition – 14 -16 October 2022

On Friday morning Year 13 set off to Burnsall in the Yorkshire Dales to start their Qualifying expedition. The day started bright and they were organised and off in good time on the first part of the route over to Grassington. They all made it to Grassington in good time but unfortunately the weather had changed and it was now raining.

Now in their waterproofs they set off on the second part of the route, following the Dales Way over to Kettlewell.



This is quite a long stretch with a climb out of Grassington, but the views from the tops are beautiful. From Kettlewell they continued up and over the ridge to where they were camping along Littondale. It was a long day and due to a lack of daylight some groups were finishing in the dark which meant they were pitching tents and cooking in the dark. They did this successfully and were soon settling down for an early night.



They woke to rain again on Saturday morning but packed up relatively quickly and set off walking. Thankfully it dried up and as a result they dried out. The main part of the second day took them along the length of the valley, through Arncliffe to Halton Gill. Despite a couple of small 'hiccups' in terms of navigating by some groups they all made it to Halton Gill to then climb up from Foxup over to the campsite in Horton in Ribblesdale. Today every group made it back before it was properly dark although some groups were still cooking in the dark. Again, good teamwork meant that this was done successfully.



It was really quite wet and windy overnight but this thankfully had cleared by the morning and they were up early to start walking their final days route to Settle via Stainforth. Spirits were high as it was the final day. With no navigation issues they all made it to Settle by lunchtime and they were able to celebrate finishing with Fish and Chips before heading home.



Well Done to everyone for working together and completing a successful Silver Qualifying expedition.

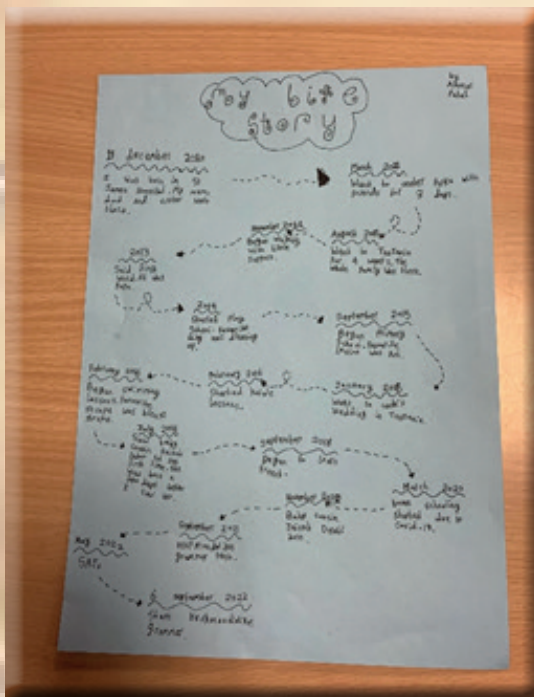
Subject Focus – History

It has been another busy term for the History department.

We welcomed our new Year 7 students in September, they have started their studies with a focus on Conquest and Control – comparing the Roman occupation of Britain to that of the Normans. After studying a historical enquiry about Maiden castle in Dorset, where 52 skeletons were found in 1936, the students discovered that a theory that these skeletons represented a Roman massacre, have now been disputed.



Using their newly honed investigation skills, the Year 7 students then conducted a historical enquiry of their own life, producing a timeline to represent their findings.



Subject Focus – History continued

In **Year 8** we have had a slight restructuring of the curriculum; this year we have started our course by looking at the 'Effects of the Empire'. This complemented the work that students did at the end of last year on the impact of the Transatlantic slave trade. Investigations on the effects of empire included looking at the impact of events such as the Partition of India and the Windrush migration. Students were able to then conduct a local study of the migratory history of Bradford, drawing links between historical events and periods of migration, as well as looking at the social, political and economic impact.

Year 9 students have made a very positive start to their GCSE studies. They have completed their first unit on 'Peacekeeping' and are now studying the League of Nations. This allows them to draw comparisons with modern day events and developments in the world today. By Christmas they will be able to place their knowledge of the League of Nations in the context of political and economic change in Europe, studying the rise of dictatorships and economic depression.

Year 10 are continuing with their study of Germany 'From Democracy to Dictatorship' and are currently looking at life in Nazi Germany. There are lots of resources which they can access to supplement their understanding of this course in particular and students in all years should keep an eye on their Teams pages where access to wider reading, podcasts and video links are often posted.

Year 11 have just completed their mock examinations. We are about to complete our course on Norman history by studying our 'Historic environment' - this is an area of study which changes every year, and this year the focus is Yorkshire after the conquest! There is a particular focus on the 'harrying of the north' and we will be studying some familiar places

We also welcomed 35 students to **Year 12** history this term. There are two teaching groups who are studying Russia during a period of revolution (1894-1924) as well as Britain during a revolutionary century (1625-1701). Students are progressing well and have completed their first assessments at A level. Once again, they should be accessing the super curricular resources and activities available for both sides of the course.



Year 13 have also just completed their mock examinations. They are incredibly busy as they are also working on coursework as well as their US Civil rights course. As part of the enrichment opportunities available to students, the department is running a 'Civil rights and race relations film club' on Wednesdays period 5. We have been watching films which are relevant to the interpretations section of the course. So far, we have watched and discussed 'To Kill a Mockingbird' and 'In the Heat of the Night', but there are more to follow, so any A level history students are welcome to join us.



Subject Focus – History continued

Heckmondwike 125

On the 17th January 1898 Heckmondwike Grammar School was established. This means that 2023 marks the 125th anniversary of the school. A group of teachers in the school – Mrs Currie, Mrs Whitelaw, Mrs Doran, Mr Currie, Miss Briggs and Mr Oxby, together with some of our Sixth form students – George Hall, Rowan Lightfoot, Charlotte Alcock, Martha Currie, Freya Thornton and Nancy Roberts, are all working on a project to commemorate this anniversary. The group is being ably assisted by Mrs Dunn and we would like to thank her for her organisational skills!



We are focusing on many aspects of school life, including the history of the school's founding, key individuals linked to the school, the changing buildings, student life, and house system and putting the school's history in the context of the changing political, social and economic situation over the 125 years.

George Hall in particular, should be singled out for his relentless work on this project. A keen local historian and genealogist, George has thrown himself into this task with enthusiasm. One of his tasks was to transcribe a handwritten history of the school, completed in 1948, on the schools 50th anniversary. The following paragraph is from the concluding comments:

“In conclusion, this fiftieth year of the school has seen another great struggle in the effort to preserve the type of education for which it has stood for half a century. It is satisfying to hear that victory has been won & Heckmondwike Grammar School will continue”.



Whilst researching this project we have discovered some fascinating gems – an exchange trip to Peronne, France in 1937 was a particular highlight, it even made the national press:



This staff photo of 1909 is certainly very different from the current staffing, in terms of numbers and dress!

A search by Mr Oxby discovered that a former headteacher, Kenneth Ford had a particularly interesting history himself. The following extract is from his obituary in the Guardian newspaper in 1999:

“The Quaker and teacher Kenneth Ford, who has died aged 88, was a conscientious objector during the Second World War, and, as a member of the Friends Ambulance Unit, one of the first people to enter Belsen concentration camp after its liberation. He was also one of the instigators of Bradford University's peace studies chair, and, for 20 years, secretary of the Quaker Peace Studies Trust. From 1956 to 1970, he was headmaster of Heckmondwike Grammar School, West Yorkshire. After the war he resumed his career in teaching. His only break while headmaster at Heckmondwike was a leave of absence to help an ailing secondary school in Lagos, Nigeria. From 1971-83 he was a counsellor with the Open University”.

Heckmondwike Remembers

When, as a school and community we remember those who have given their lives in conflict across the world. Heckmondwike Grammar School has a rich history associated with both world wars and the names of the fallen are remembered on the roll of honour and war memorial in the school. This is a particular area which George Hall has done a tremendous amount of work. He has put together the following montage, a collection of all the soldiers from the School's war memorial from the First World War:



Ranging from Manchester to Canada to India, the story of the old boys and girls of what is now Heckmondwike Grammar School has interested and moved me for the last year or so. During this time, it has not been the MBEs, Military Crosses or Distinguished Conduct Medals,



nor particularly the details of the war itself, that has stuck out but rather the photos, memories and letters which connect people who died a century ago to the life and the soul of the school today. For example, I share the same house (Priestley) with a few of the old boys, one being Harold Lawrenson. I know of the old boys' and girls' sporting and acting talents, and also that two old boys, namely Louis Ackroyd and William Ewart Hopkinson were appointed prefects in 1908. The latter two were also quite prominent in the Debating Society. I therefore created the collage above to remember not just the names and ranks but the souls, dreams and spirit of the old scholars that gave the ultimate sacrifice during the First World War. We will remember them.

Murder Most Foul



On the evening of Wednesday 9th November, a number of sixth formers had the pleasure of taking part in a mock homicide investigation presented by two retired detectives from the Homicide and Major Enquiry Division of West Yorkshire Police. The presentation began with a short video showing a number of cases from West Yorkshire that the 2 detectives had worked on, including the Shannon Matthews disappearance - opening our eyes to the reality of violent crime. We then moved onto a mock homicide investigation that we would be working through in smaller groups.



The investigation was called Operation Gemma – the abduction and murder of a 9 year old girl in Holmfirth. The detectives took us through the key details of the case, including where she was last seen and when the body was found before we had to make a decision on what enquiries we would make to start off the case. Some enquiries the groups came up with were checking CCTV, searching the route Gemma took before she was abducted and taking eye-witness statements, before the multiple other possibilities were revealed by the detectives. The next step in the case was what actions we would take – ultimately, the choice was to arrest the suspect.



This gave the homicide team freedom to search the suspect's house and vehicle for any other clues as to whether or not they committed the murder. Guidance was offered on what was to be included in the suspect interview plan following the arrest: where the suspect was at the time of the incident, as well as how, why, where, and when they did it, if necessary. A short discussion on what the media and the suspect's solicitors would be told for the best possible outcome on the case, in order to avoid too much being said to the suspect's solicitor so that the suspect remains truthful to their story.

Finally, the detectives explained what would happen to the suspect if there was sufficient evidence that they committed the homicide... however – there was a plot twist! Another suspect was discovered by accident 3 years after the incident took place, which led to more investigations and eventually he was charged due to his DNA being at the scene, and the initial suspect was released from prison. The detectives then played a short clip about the actual homicide that our fake scenario had been based on, revealing every process that the detectives went through to solve the case and how they came to their conclusion.



Overall, the group had an amazing time learning about the work that goes on behind the scenes in a homicide investigation and how the senior detective inspectors come to their conclusions. Haadi H said, "It was a really nice experience, I learnt a lot and really enjoyed it.". Jasmin B told us, "I thought it was brilliant. It was an amazing experience being able to talk to the detectives and get a feel for what it's like to work on a real case. Being able to speak to them and hear about some of the cases they worked on was fantastic in itself, if given the opportunity, I would love to do it again.". Therefore, we'd like to say a big thank you to the ex-Detectives for giving up their time to come and talk to us, and provide us with an opportunity to experience what a real investigation would look like, as well as a big thank you to Miss Brooksby for organising this event for us.
