Dear Parent/Carer

As I write this letter, the sun is shining, the birds are singing and there is a real spring in our steps as at last we have navigated through the miserable weather and dark mornings and evenings. Whilst we are always of a very optimistic disposition at HGS, this is never more so than when we get to Easter.

Whilst very stressful for those involved with GCSE and A levels, we are really excited to be in the final push towards the May/June exams. Everything is going really well for the 2 year groups and the recent mock examination results showed we are on track for some excellent results this summer. The students have had excellent preparation so far and the final responsibility is now for the individual students and the hard graft that will inevitably be involved.

Following covid, we have had a real push to get our extra-curricular provision to the highest standard of provision and this has really paid off. We now have over 100 clubs, typically at lunch times. For clarification, the sibling rule applies if on admission into year 7 in September, the student has an elder sibling on role in the school, in any one of the year groups, including the sixth form. This can make a big difference to children/families in this situation.
